BEATRICE

Eavesdropping Across Time

In the 14th C, as now, differences of opinion divided communities, split families, and led to bloody revenge. Beatrice de Planissoles lived in Montaillou, a small village in the middle of the Pyrenees - one of the last strongholds of the Cathers, A Christian sect deemed heretical by the Inquisition. She was a woman who valued her independence. Her friends included many of the leading families who secretly practised the Cather faith - including the local priest.

As the Inquisition tightened it's hold betrayals became commonplace. Property could be confiscated, and heretics burnt at the stake. Their fear was such that people gave evidence against their friends, husbands, and wives. Beatrice lived alone, but when the shadow of the Inquisition seized her lover the shadow of suspicion fell on her too.

Arriving in the 20th C. by a devious route which started with the Inquisition's own records, BEATRICE is like a shaft of light into the emotional life of a whole community. Wife, mother, mistress and heretic she speaks clearly across the centuries outspoken, irreverent and full of humour even in her darkest hour.
